- 35 of 100 U.S. Senate seats,
- All 435 House of Representative seats;
- 36 of 50 state Governors;
- 82% of state legislators in the U.S.;
- 300 state appellate judges, including 71 supreme court judges.

All of these positions have impacts on local citizen's, which is why voting each election is critical. Knowing positions is also important and knowing where to go to find the facts is even more important. Medical care, social security, taxes and help for caregivers are just some of the important issues that elected officials will be dealing with in the next term.
